An Iron Coalition supply ship, the St. Bernard, exploded on its way to meet another Coalition ship, the Vimy at Mars. Preliminary investigation of the wreckage suggests the St. Bernard suffered an uncontrolled fusion reaction within its maneuver drives. No cause for this reaction has been determined.

This is the third Coalition ship to explode mysteriously on the Mars run in the last two months. In each case, the vessel seems to have destroyed itself. One rumor has been confirmed, however. Initial reports -- denied by GigaCorp and Iron Coalition representatives -- state that an independent mining ship, the Hermes, was destroyed after straying through the disputed Aleph.

The following statement, from a Belter enclave near Epsilon Indi, was delivered to Martian, Lunar, and independent news agencies less than an hour ago:

From: Ragnarok Independent Prospectors, Ltd.

Today, at 1900 hours local time, the non-combatant vessel Hermes, a RIP, Ltd. vessel captained by Capt. Augustus Riley, was destroyed by clashing military forces near the so-called "Aladdin" system (officially designated GC-109).

Though several crewmembers were able to "ripcord" to safety, several crewmembers -- including Captain Riley -- are missing, presumed dead.

The attack comes in response to an Iron Coalition statement claiming responsibility for the destruction of the Hermes, a Belter prospector ship owned by Sholes and his associates.

The Belter attack force -- which consisted of a handful of smaller capital ships and at least 30 fighters and bombers -- struck without warning, destroying at least 10 Iron Coalition fighters that were deployed against nearby GigaCorp anti-starfighter emplacements.

Sholes' flagship, the Sky Raptor, inflicted severe damage against the Odysseus, reportedly the Iron Coalition command ship, and preferred craft of General Fisk, the IC leader.

As a result of the Belter attack and the damage it inflicted on the Odysseus, GigaCorp forces were able to launch a counter-offensive, forcing a retreat. The current whereabouts of the Coalition forces is not known.

GigaCorp forces were jubilant. Mercedes Kelleher, current CEO of GigaCorp, made a rare public appearance, broadcasting a real-time transmission to her forces.

According to GigaCorp sources, feared pirate "Black Hand" Lennox struck the Hastur Station free port to capture He3, food, and air.

Casualties are estimated to be in the thousands, and hundreds are dead. Preliminary reports indicate that Lennox's forces deliberately targeted housing domes and other non-combatant targets to force surrender.

The Iron Coalition is known for many things, but the purple prose of its press packages isn't one of them. When asked why this package had been released, Fisk's lieutenant, Major Robert Terrence, stated, "There's been a lot of misinformation disseminated about the General, much of it by GigaCorp. We wanted to show there's more to this man than most people realize. Yes, he's a soldier, but that doesn't mean he isn't a human being as well. Listening to some of the stories you see circulated in the media -- and I'm including DataNet here as well -- you'd think otherwise. The General isn't an ogre. In fact, he's quite easy to get along with once you know him. This package was released to facilitate just that."

Fisk himself was unavailable for comment.

The recently restless GigaCorp security forces struck out again yesterday, attacking the Iron Coalition quarantine fleet. The quarantine area is roughly adjacent to Orion's Chain, though further to the solar side of the belt. Iron Coalition forces in the region had been recently reinforced due to the increased GigaCorp activity. The Coalition forces had also begun to tighten base and checkpoint security, causing longer delays for Belter traders.

One of the Belter ships that was stopped at a Coalition checkpoint witnessed the beginning of the battle. While the CTU Ganges' reports have not been confirmed, they state that several GigaCorp destroyers and around a dozen GigaCorp fighters emerged from deep within the Belts and began to open fire on the Iron Coalition Outpost Hibernia. The belief is that the BIOS focused more on the Thrusters in early battle else the results may have been different. *Xeth*, *Fragtzack*, *jerukhan*, *KGJV* and *mCyrus* each got 4 kills and *Tidan1* got 2 base kills. *Rage15* did a beautiful job of scouting the enemy locations with 6 alephs located -- but, again, enemy bombers were able to push through and slam into the Vapor's bases.

Finally it was down to the two BIOS factions. From ejection pod beacons, we've been able to determine the 2 factions were *DNA strand 12xc* and *DNA strand Vce3*. In their fierceness to gather the gene structures they so desire, they exploded into conflict over the each other's war treasures.

DNA Vce3 garnered 101 kills, while suffering 33 deaths and 155 ejections. Cobol-Enchanter achieved 8 kills, and Gepatto, 6kills. Antipater_, Hunterseekr and PabloExtreme each grabbed 5 kills. Where Vce3 really shined was with their bomber crews: Spliine tagged 5 bases and insane_chill took out 4. Even Black Viper_BS trashed 3 enemy miners to help the DNA Vce3 last as long as they did.

The Vce3 did pull in 20 base kills to keep their chances alive but it was the DNA 12cx that took out 25 bases and captured victory this day. The team acquired 201 kills while only ejecting 107 times themselves. *Neoplasmosis*, a name to fear in Allegiance space, eradicated 17 enemies in the 1-hour-and-18-minute firefight. *BigDelite@Alleg*, with uncanny precision at the bomber controls, took out 7 bases.

If the BIOS continue to wreak havoc in the inner-system such as this, it is only a matter of time before Lunar I.C Headquarters falls to the BIOS -- and then what's next? Mars?

On May 29th, 2150, the Belters finally drew a line in space, telling the GigaCorp that they were not welcome -- and then preceded to prevent GigaCorp from crossing the line into what the Belters feel is their "home turf".

Twice, the prominent GigaCorp faction, the *Falcons*, established a foothold on the edge of the Asteroid Belt but was decimated each time. Here's what I've been able to determine from long-range detection sensors and radio buoys afloat in the inner system:

First Assault

The *GC Falcons* tried valiantly to get bombers through and make a dent on the Belter factions but to no avail. The *Reveres* grabbed 102 kills and also took out 16 bases and even captured 2 of them. *Sarumen* is a legend in the making with 22 kills in the one conflict while *AKAvenger* and *ErMaC318* took 15 and 14 respectively. *Fossil@Alleg* led the charge on bomber attacks smashing 7 enemy bases to oblivion.

I thought with the beating the GigaCorp took in their first assault that they wouldn't be back but the GigaCorp are persistent if nothing else.

Second Assault

The second conflict lasted nearly two hours as the battles raged through sectors in the Belt. The GigaCorp *Falcons*, refreshed with newly trained recruits and battle-hardened veterans, took the battle again to the Belters. *BraveheartII* took out 8 enemy pilots while *Bifasaurus_Rex* took out 6 but it was only a matter of time -- 90 minutes to be exact.

Again, the remaining Belter factions took to each other over He3 and salvage rights. For another 15 minutes they fought tooth-and-nail. *Theodred* took 8 kills for The Reveres this time, but it wasn't enough.

The *Steamers* rolled over The *Reveres* grabbing 112 kills and taking out 23 enemy bases. *Snelson5* eliminated 21 kills and *deadeyes0* took 13. *TC_Dagger* destroyed 9 bases with some outstanding bomber piloting and good fighter escorts.

Where does this leave the Belters and GigaCorp now? Will the GigaCorp re-evaluate their intentions toward Mars and refocus on the Belt or is this just a one-time incident? We'll have to wait and see how events unfold over the coming week.

In a move that can only add more tension to the already volatile belt, especially given the latest conflicts, GigaCorp has announced the grand opening of its *New Concorde Armaments Works*. This factory, built on a colony platform just outside the belt, will manufacture fighters and other small craft. Miguel Sanchez has stated these new ships will be used for defensive purposes by the colonies and their GigaSecurity contractors.

The opening of this new factory has raised many concerns about the legitimacy of GigaCorp's "Coloni-Care" program. From surveying several Data_node long-range transmissions from last week, that's what appears to have happened in an organized attack on both Jupiter and Saturn BIOS factional bases.

Even though each side has some nominal forces secretly built at the start, the *Rapiers* were the first to feel the bite of battle. After an hour and 10 minutes, the *Rapiers* fell to the bite of BIOS. The *Rapiers* did account for their presence, scoring 77 kills with 29 kills and 129 ejections. The Iron Coalition *Bulldogs* fought valiantly while the BIOS factions began fighting between themselves in attempts to gather the floating specimens available for their gene research. The *DNA Beta G1s* and *Alpha Xvs* were a close match, even with the steady hand of *Kevdude_SF* commanding the Alphas, but *Gunjove* and *Malphigian* with 4 and 3 base captures each brought the battle to a quicker end than it deserved. *Malphigian* also took 10 kills as well in the defeat of the Alphas. Some 15 minutes after the GigaCorp were defeated, the Alphas were destroyed.

Now a valiant battle persisted between the *DNA Beta G1s* and the *Bulldogs*. All too quickly, though, it became clear that Rixian philosophy meant: *join us or die*, and Rixian warships quickly dispatched Iron Coalition and BIOS parties sent to meet them.

However, hope for the fate of mankind has clearly rekindled. BIOS and Belter forces, aligning in secret, last night met and defeated a Rixian fleet. Information sent to DataNet reveal that the BIOS unit, *DNA Mega Rzx1*, did the most to ensure victory. BIOS pilot, *Braveheart II* alone chalked up 21 Rixian kills, with his partner, *TC_AgentSmith*, claiming an additional 20 kills himself. *Cy72's* bombing runs succeeded in scoring 5 base kills.

The Belters, though not as prominent, helped with their part as well. Most notably, *ryjamsan* defeated 6 Rixian pilots and *_SRM_snake* supplied 2 base kills.

However important, the victory was not won lightly. Some BIOS and Belter pilots were forced to eject upward of eleven times. And the Rixians themselves proved more than capable, with the likes of *Ahaneon@Alleg* scoring 18 kills and *NB_CLINT30* scoring 16.

While the victory is still being celebrated, more issues are raised. One Rixian unit has been defeated in combat -- how will the rest of the Unity respond? And an earlier broadcast from the aliens, an open call for recruits, did not fall on entirely deaf ears; already many, especially BIOS pilots, have answered the call. These BIOS defections have also succeeded in drawing concern among the other factions. After yesterday's battle, in unlikely fashion, the BIOS and Belters agreed to leave the field in continued truce. For the Belters, they had their pick of Rixian craft to salvage. And the BIOS left, apparently content to collect the remains of Rixian pilots for research. Or, as some speculate, is all this merely an attempt to add Rixian genes to their own?

Report filed by: "KronkiteNOW". Rixians gain revenge against BIOS.

After the first major defeat of the Rixians, the alien Unity managed to marshal its forces to defeat an attack force of approximately 30 BIOS pilots. The hour-long battle took place last night in an undisclosed sector of space near the rings of Saturn.

The BIOS, characteristically silent in regards to DataNet postings, provided no information. However, Belter pilots, aware of the battle and sent in afterwards to salvage wreckage, did provide the Net with some clues to the battle. MuzakMan, one such Belter pilot with the salvage team, had this to say:

"The Rix mighta won, but not easy! Looked like about 50 of their ships got destroyed out there.
