#### **Rixians Pressed for Space**

The DataNet boards have been busy all week, with various factions looking to recruit the best of the independent scout pilots. Although factions are often reluctant to openly reveal their identity on the boards, several have been openly posting such advertisements, such as the one below, with the apparent hope of recruiting more "independently" minded pilots:

#### Looking for adventure and excitement? Prepared to defend mankind?

If so, the Iron Coalition may be looking for you! Recent deep system activities have required us to seek out the best scout pilots not yet affiliated with any faction. If you have you logged significant time in the seat of any scout-class ship, or have completed military-style contracts for ANY faction, give your local IC recruiter a call. Please note, that having performed any contract directly against the IC WILL NOT automatically disqualify you.

As of last night, the reasons behind this recent recruiting drive have become abundantly clear. Several factions have reportedly sent scouting parties to Rixian sectors, presumably in the interest of gaining control over those Alephs believed to lead back to the Rixian homeworld. However, little success seems to have been made by the faction scouts and their recently recruited mercenaries . . . except for those in the BIOS *Gen-6x4* squad.

Arriving in Rixian space, the aliens were quick to defend their Alephs, dropping scores of devastating gun pods and laying several fields of anti-ship mines. In the face of such bristling defense, IC and Belter scouts were quickly turned away. However, the Gen-6 squad, most likely disdaining the use of fickle mercenaries, managed to establish themselves in the outskirts of the sector area, refusing to be pushed out by continued assault waves of Rixian fighters.

Those returning mercs have begun posting word of the battle. As full payment of their contracts apparently hinges on a certain amount of non-disclosure, none have been willing to discuss the reasons behind this scouting expedition. They have, however, made reference to the fact that the Rixians most heavily defended the areas immediately surrounding the Alephs, preventing anyone from flying through. #### System Showdown

The Rixians crusaders, seem unable -- or unwilling -- to communicate with this system's residents beyond persistent messages about joining their cause, following their Code . . . messages even more fanatical than the Iron Coalition's.

As such, most posts on the DataNet boards by Rixian agents remain largely ignored. One can only hear the same message repeated for so many times before completely tuning it out. Consider GigaCorp's past advertisement campaign for their now defunct BioWear line. However, in recent days, Rixian posts seemed to increase not only in frequency, but in severity as well. The other factions' aggression against Rixian-controlled Alephs no doubt helped spurn the Rixian Unity to warn of an impending campaign to "cleanse the system of all non-believers."

Sources report that at 17:12 last evening, this promised Rixian campaign began. Their reinforcements, having arrived last week and ambushed for the tech-cargo they carried, seemed to have finally organized effective strike units. Just as another wave of IC and GigaCorp scouts arrived at the Alephs, far more heavily armed than for their first sorties, the Rixian carriers unleashed wave after wave of assault fighters.

In their attempt to drive off all human interlopers, however, it would seem the Rixians failed to concentrate on their greatest threat -- the BIOS.

BIOS stations had remained near the Alephs since their preliminary scouting missions earlier this week, stubbornly refusing to retreat in the face of Rixian "encouragement." As the Rixians themselves withdrew, to collect their forces and prepare for last night's assault, they unwittingly left the BIOS time to organize effective battle plans of their own.

History between these two factions has always been sorted. In philosophical posts on the `Net, the Rixians have long considered the BIOS as the one faction with the greatest potential, viewing the BIOS advancement of genetics similar to the Unity's religious desire of ascension. For some time, the BIOS even appeared to join forces with the Rixians, sending countless recruits to the Unity ranks . . . until it was determined that these recruits were nothing but spies sent to steal Rix tech.

According to our sources, no one but the BIOS themselves were aware that yet another generation of soldiers had been prepared. As the Rixians attacked, the BIOS pilots, calling themselves Gen-7a, were unleashed into battle, where they quickly devastated not only the Rixians, but ships of all other factions as well. Survivors report certain Gen-7a pilots, flying under such call-names as *Rain\_Dog, JanmanX*, and *GMANXpolar*, as fighting with seemingly unlimited energy and unprecedented ferocity. As the Rixians did their best to fend off Gen-7a, forced to concentrate two or three fighters against a single BIOS ship, Gen-7a pilots proved just how hardy they were. #### **A Mutiny Fails**

#### A message from the editor

The following report was sent in by one of the IC's chief press officers. Despite its critique of the DataNet boards, we feel that censoring Colonel Jefferson's message would go against the very philosophy of the DataNet both he and the IC protest. The DataNet remains the only unbiased source of information left to the system. Rest assured, all sources and posts will continue to be kept in the strictest confidentiality.

This message is being sent for two express purposes. First, to condemn the actions of those younger pilots who sought to commit the serious offense of mutiny against their ranking officers yesterday. The second is to condemn all members of the Iron Coalition who seek to breach IC's policy of non-disclosure of any and all information to outside agencies.

As to the first part: Yesterday evening, an initial group of approximately thirty enlisted pilots sought to wage an illegal and unmitigated attack on their ranking officers. The reasons behind this attack were clear: In recent weeks, several voices have been raised, crying out for an invasion of Rixian space via the Aleph portals the Rixian Unity currently guards. #### **Recent History**

Over the past weekend, history was made as humanity launched its first military campaign outside of the solar system.

True, ever since the discovery of the Alephs, scouting missions have traveled deeper and deeper into uncharted territories. Yet, most of these missions remained pet projects of the factions, who sought to discover new supplies of He3 and other resources. As a result, the incredible supply of data these missions must have gathered has remained locked away, unavailable for public consumption.

With the breach of the Rixian defense around key Alephs, however, the human factions have seemingly put together a concerted effort to invade the Unity's home system. #### **Further Victory for Humanity**

Humanity continues to roll over the Rixian Unity, it would seem, achieving further victory last night in the aliens' home sectors.

For the first time, human factions were able to breach the Rixians' planetary defenses, opening the way for possible bombing campaigns of the alien homeworld itself. Led by the military machine of the Iron Coalition, the human forces were further supplemented by a unit of Belter "free agents." Together, these combined forces annihilated the joint Rixian squads sent to drive them back. Even more remarkable than last night's victory may be the fact that for the first time in recent memory, an alliance between human factions held strong throughout the conflict before peacefully leaving the field.

Of course, the lack of a cohesive Rixian defense did nothing but assure the humans their victory. Unlike the previous success of *Rix Deefnd*, the two Rixian units sent out against the invaders last night seemed not only unable to effectively respond to the humans but also unwilling to work together. Reports have come back claiming these two Rixian units actually traded shots with one another in the face of the invasion force.

If such is true, does this signal a complete breakdown within the Rixians? Previously, infighting has been determined to be a clever ruse, designed to draw attackers close enough for planetary defense forces to destroy them. #### **Current Military Strategy**

The following report comes from Iron Coalition channels.

#### Priority: 1 (Top Secret: for official eyes only) Operation: Squelch Intelligence Summary

In the midst of the current military situation, we have learned that GigaCorp has launched a secondary psych-ops campaign of its own. The goal of their primary campaign echoes that of all human factions currently participating in the war efforts: defeat of the Rixian Unity. The goal of their secondary campaign, however, is to achieve the most advantageous position in regard to Rixian reparations pending the outcome of the conflict.

This can be assumed following Miguel Sanchez's statements released yesterday, condemning the plan to bomb the Unity homeworld into submission. While an effective bombing campaign will prove the only sure means of forcing a Rixian surrender, if GigaCorp voices its opposition to it now, they will be the one faction with which the Unity will likely look to negotiate a peace settlement. The Unity may then look to GigaCorp to facilitate distribution of any and all war reparations.

Such a psych-ops campaign cannot be allowed to achieve even partial victory. The sooner the Rixians look to negotiate with GigaCorp, the more dangerous GigaCorp will become to the Iron Coalition. It is possible that the Rixians will go so far as to make an offer of alliance with GigaCorp even before the war's end. If such an alliance forms, the Coalition's chances for victory will be greatly diminished.

The entire human alliance threatens to dissolve if no action is taken. Already, representatives from the Belter Unions have demanded increased pay rates. And if GigaCorp is allowed to jump sides and ally with the Rixians, then all is lost.

The best course of action would be to assault GigaCorp's primary fighting units as soon as possible. If placed in a position of needing supplies and repairs this far from its home sectors, GigaCorp will most likely look to the Iron Coalition for aid and forego any further attempt to ally with the Rixian Unity.

On the matter of the DataNet: Efforts to mask all reports of the gathering invasion force appear to have fully succeeded. Those early leaks made to the DataNet boards worked in IC's favor, using the follow-up release to deny that any military campaign in Rixian Space would be possible. #### Deathmatch

Never have the full brutalities of warfare been more fully realized than last night.

These days, stellar conflict has become a somewhat sterilized fighting system. True, in the heated dogfights, dozens, even hundreds of pilots are forced to eject during a single battle. Yet, once in their life pods, few are further assaulted by their enemies. Most factions aim for the destruction of costly ships, while so-called "pod-killing" of live pilots is almost universally frowned upon. With such a mindset, a faction such as GigaCorp, with huge war coffers yet limited military experience, has managed to become a major force to be reckoned with.

Last night, however, few pilots chose to follow the accepted conventions of modern war. The Rixians, with their home planet at stake, launched an attack designed apparently not to win back human-controlled sectors, but to exterminate all pilots in those sectors.

Of all the human pilots, the Gen-7 BIOS proved the most capable to counter just such an attack. As has been witnessed before, once released from their hibernation-tanks during transportation and released into battle, almost nothing can stop these Gen-7's.

While the battle, dubbed *Anyone's Guess* by fellow war correspondents, had a definite start time of approximately 17:16 UST, there was no apparent end. All five units participating left the field still in control of a piece of sector territory. Instead of sector conquest, then, the real winner appears to have been the unit achieving the most kills -- in this case, *Gen 7z1* of the BIOS.

For now, the Rixians have failed in their attempt to exterminate the BIOS pilots. However, as has been hinted at in past battles, they may not need to put forth so much effort. Members of the BIOS council have admitted shipping the dangerous Gen-7's *in stasis*. Although they have not made any comments on further rumors that the Gen-7 pilots simply die off after an extremely short period of time, witnesses to the battle have advanced this claim. #### **Recalled Home**

History may very well come to view the Rixians as a peaceful race. Even when that war is designed to defend their very planet.

Consider the Rixians' latest efforts. Recalling their missionaries from work abroad, these Rixians returned to bolster defensive units -- with little or nor effect. Yet again, the Gen-7 BIOS proved their superiority, routing both Rix missionary units with the help of GigaCorp reinforcements.

#### An Invasion Fails

As this war correspondence continues, it would seem that the military campaign underway in Rixian space might be coming to an end sooner than anyone anticipated. Yet while just last week the Rixian Unity seemed all but ready to fold, this week it is the human alliance threatening to dissolve.

Over the weekend, several key events occurred, leading to the complete reversal of the war's momentum. Long-time rivals, GigaCorp and the Iron Coalition, managed to put their differences aside in order to coordinate the upcoming bombing campaign. GigaCorp themselves offered to launch the initial attacks on the Rixian planet, with the desired effect of softening up the planetary defenses -- and this following GigaCorp's recent public protest against just such a campaign. #### Ambush: Earth

Since the launch of the Rix Wars, the Rixian Unity has increasingly come to be known for its strategic tricks. #### Negotiations

Having failed to ambush Earth, senior members of the Rixian Unity agreed to meet last night with leaders of the human factions in the hopes of negotiating a peace settlement.

#### Succession

For whatever good it seems to have done, the Iron Coalition laid waste to several BIOS-controlled sectors of space yesterday.

While the BIOS decreed themselves free from human law, the Coalition has made every military attempt to show them the error of their thinking. Last night, the IC continued their campaign, finally managing to destroy a BIOS Gen-7 defensive unit after over five hours of fighting. Further proof that there are battles fought fast and hard... and then there are epic battles spanning the course of an entire evening.

Yet, several strange occurrences took place during the course of last night's battle, in addition to its incredible length. For one, in order to achieve their victory, the Coalition may have allied, at least for a short while, with GigaCorp. Bitter rivals, the two factions have appeared to be on friendlier terms ever since the mutual alliance formed against the Rixian Unity. #### Domination

Yesterday's fighting between Belter units has apparently cost them their He3 claim. While the other factions and the IC usually fail to see eye-to-eye, the IC brass has managed to assemble some impressive alliances in recent days -- particularly against the Rixian Unity. While the Rixians have begun sending reinforcements into the system, the threat of allied human forces continuing to work against them might prove an impossible barrier.

As of yet, no officials from any human faction have commented as to why the Rixians are even trying to gain a foothold in human space. At present time, all factions seem to be desperate for He3 -- a resource the Rixians would appear to have in abundance in their region. It may be possible that the Unity truly does want nothing more than to spread word of their philosophical Code. If so, they will have an extraordinarily tough audience to face. First storming the system by force, the Rixian Unity may now be trying a more patient approach.

Of course, while the first steps to establishing a more permanent foothold in the solar system will meet stiff resistance, the Rixians have proven excellent strategists in the past. Last night's victory does nothing to refute this. If the Rix are trying to build a base in the region, they've acted wisely in making the first aggressive move against their toughest single opponent.

Still, questions remain. Why are the Rix remaining so concerned with our species? Perhaps the humans' successful invasion of their space instilled the Unity with a deeper sense of respect for the human race. The more we defeat them, the more worthy they may consider us for conversion.

# **IC's Genetic Ploy**

Suspiciously cheery, and yet the message does seem to have a grain of truth to it. In recent days, the IC has won victory after victory. Are these victories at the hands of happy IC pilots, though? Or their genetically fabricated replacements?

#### Mars

GigaCorp has officially acknowledged giving asylum to the IC defectors. Stating that the pilots came to them out of their own free will, and in serious need of medical attention, they had no choice but to follow the accepted conventions of war and rescue the pilots.

The Iron Coalition, as expected, has loudly protested GigaCorp's actions, claiming that they bribed the pilots to defect, along with their valuable IC ships.

### **Deep Space**

After the Rixian Wars, humanity believed they had delivered their message clearly: Stay out of the Solar System. As all reports would indicate, however, the Rixians have actually begun sending further crusaders through the Aleph portals.

Their goal? While the first vanguard wave of Rixians attempted to convert by force, this second wave appears to have taken a more peaceful (some would say, insidious) approach. ### He3

With all the conflicts ongoing in the system, the need for one resource stands behind them all. He3. Powering everything from ships to shields to weapons systems, the drive for He3 is stronger than ever. Yet, as studies have indicated, the actual amount of this precious ore is in terribly short supply. Without the stuff, will the wars be able to continue? Or will needed expeditions, into even more far-reaching systems, be launched?

# Catch-22

For those of wondering about the origins of this cute little phrase, it goes something like this:

Some time ago, Iron Coalition pilots began to grow increasingly wary of the conditions they were being sent into. Storming over the lunar plains, the pilots were often mowed down by heavily fortified defensive positions (positions manned by GigaCorp, which also leads to the origin of that particular rivalry). IC ships were also often "leaked" mid-flight; that is, enemy saboteurs would breach the ships' hulls, and leak out all the oxygen, killing the IC crews inside. ### Lockdown
